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Content

Students are presented with the concept of homiletics and different preaching traditions; various preaching models and methods are offered to provide the basis for preaching practices. The theological foundations of homily, based on scripture and confessions are explained. Attention is paid to both homily content and form. As part of the course, students learn the steps needed to prepare a homily and acquire skills in their appropriate delivery. The technique and correct pronunciation of sound, breathing and clear and resonant speech is learned, the ability to speak publicly, overcome excitement, and the ability to express the nature of the message. The course takes the form of lectures and practice. In the interim test, the student presents a reading from Scripture.

Aims

- Provide theoretical insight into homiletic discipline and create an understanding of the homiletic ministry of the Church.
- Help students to prepare for the delivery of the Scriptures, both in substance and in technical terms, by deliberately and purposefully practicing voice and enunciation, and by using a variety of means of content discovery.
